Speeding vehicles on our streets

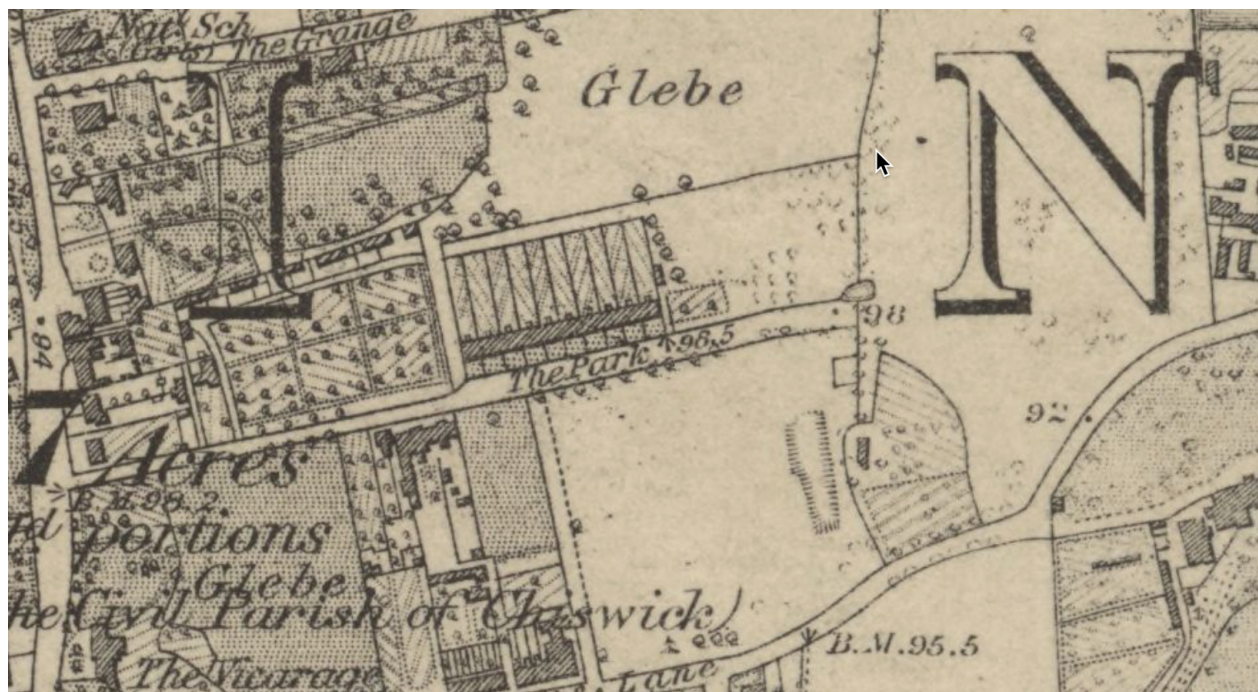
One of the local concerns that the police have now picked up on is that of speeding vehicles. They will shortly be using a speed camera gun within the Ealing Common Ward to address the issue. Be warned if you drive yourself. Someone I know in another borough was prosecuted for travelling at 23mph in a 20mph zone.

Parking in our Controlled Parking Zone

Be careful how you park on our streets. We have had people fined for parking with wheels just onto the kerb and for parking wide of the dotted white lines that mark the edge of the parking area.

Did you know?

When the houses now numbered 17 to 26 The Park were built in 1846, they were in the middle of nowhere. Most of the houses have very long back gardens and when they were built there was a cart track at the back that ran from Kenilworth Road to what is now the garage extension of 8 Kerrison Villas. That is why 29 Kenilworth Road is on a narrower plot than other properties in the street. The track must have fallen out of use some time later, as some of it seems to have been split into plots as shown on a map we have from the early 1890s.
